## President's Message



### A Message From The President - March 2022

I am writing this in February and happy to report that a few green sprouts pushed their way through cold earth and revealed themselves along a neighborhood road. Their greening spread through me and signaled first signs of spring next month. Many poets have written about such occasions of unexpected joy. These works are often composed in first or third person as an observation without a more confessional point of view. The difference is worth considering.

It is not as common to write a poem that may serve to talk to ourselves, one that might be read by someone else but not necessarily. How often do we confess something on our mind that once written starts to clarify, heal, sooth, celebrate or perhaps scold? Poetry can serve as our best listener and scribe, a confidant that feeds back our yearnings, fears, joys and hopes. We can use the power of poetry to befriend us when no one else is available or the topic too personal to speak aloud to others. Personal poems can record moments that serve as reminders of our life journeys whether shared or not. Sometimes world events, often outside our control, can rattle moments of tranquility. It's then that a conversation between self and self via succinct language into the deepest concerns can offer solace, a sorting out and a possible mending meditation. Emily Dickinson's poems are often a conversation with no apparent audience but rather an exploration of ideas expressed on the pages she mostly kept tucked away. Enjoy these days sliding into spring and happy writing.

## ISPS Manningham Poetry Contest Status

This year's Manningham Poetry Contest for students saw a large increase in both number of schools participating and the number of poem submissions received. We received a total of 143 poems from 34 schools compared to last year we received 126 poems from 26 school. Breaking the stats down further - Junior high division: 20 poems from 8 schools; Senior division: 123 poems, 26 schools!

Currently the poems are being reviewed by the two judges. ISPS Manningham Poetry Contest results will be reported in the May/June issue of the ISPS newsletter.

### **New Procedure for Posting ISPS Member Poems on Website**

Alan Harris has announced a new procedure for posting poems/haiga written by ISPS members on the ISPS website. Instead of a bi-monthly posting of all poems submitted, he will do a posting every month for about 1/4 of the membership, based on the member's last initial. For April, 2022, poems/haiga submitted by members whose last name begins with A - D will be posted; for May, E - H; for June, I - M; for July, N - Z; etc. To discover the months your poem/haiga can be submitted, and to read our other submission guidelines, see [illinoispoets.org/submitting.htm](http://illinoispoets.org/submitting.htm). The net effect of this change will be that a member may submit one poem and/or haiga every four months instead of every two months. The submission period has been reduced from 14 days to 7 days (the first 7 days of each month).

## Illinois State Poetry Society-Haiku Society of America Haiku Chapter



shaking tree awake at dawn.


