Also, check on the BlackBerry Peach National Poetry competition that member Wesley Frazier-Keys competed in this year. Remember to keep your membership active in order to participate in ongoing and future activities.

Recently, I attended a workshop that was about writing poetry that is personally hard to express and thus, difficult to put down on paper. It could be about any number of different topics such as telling someone we love them, disclosing fears of dying, terror resulting from world events or what has happened in our town or family among many other ideas. The topic is an evocative challenge often difficult to face or describe. It is not necessarily meant to be shared with everyone; although, it might be appreciated by readers who feel the same way and could gain some solace from the poem.

What we poets have is a long reach into not only ourselves but the connection with other poets and nonpoets. We can express what poets have done long before us— a voice that is unafraid to address the human range of emotions from angst to great joy. We can be the bearer of words not only spoken to ourselves but to others who also seek a better understanding of our mortality, as Emily Dickinson expressed in the following excerpt:

I'm Nobody! Who are you? Are you nobody too? Then there's a pair of us—don't tell! They'd banish us, you know!

SUBMISSION GUIDELINES

Any submission that does not follow ALL guidelines will be disqualified.

1. Eligibility. Original work of a single student in a public or private Illinois school or home-schooled in Illinois.

2. Entries. Submit only one poem per contest.

3. Unpublished. Poems published in print or online or accepted for publication (except in school publications) are ineligible.

4. Simultaneous submissions. Poems currently entered in other contests are ineligible.

POEM & PAGE FORMAT

• English only.

• **30 line limit**: All text and blank lines count except the title and one blank line following the title.

• Line width. No line may exceed 50 characters, including punctuation marks and spaces.

• Single-spaced lines. (Set line spacing options to 0 pt. before and 0 pt. after).

- One poem per 8.5" x 11" page.
- **Typed** or computer-generated, 12 point, plain font (Times New

Roman preferred) on white paper.

• Title all poems except haiku.

HOW TO PREPARE MAILINGS

1. Submit two typed copies of each poem (one anonymous for the judge; one with ID). Include contest number and title on the upper left of both.

2. ID COPY ONLY: On the upper right of ID copy, add:

- Name of Student
- Age and Grade
- Name of School
- School address with city/state/zip (required for ISPS and Manningham notification of winners)
- Teacher/Sponsor (include first and

last name and Mr./Ms./Mrs.).

• Teacher/Sponsor's email address.

3. Originality declaration. The ID copy must also include a statement of originality, signed by the student:

"I certify that this poem is my original work and has not been copied in whole or part from any author's poem in print or posted on the Internet."

4. Copies. Do not separate the copies. Do not staple the copies together.

5. Batched Mailings: Teachers/sponsors may send all students' poems in one envelope.

- · Sort poems by contest number.
- Keep anonymous and ID copies together (no staples).
- Include your email address.

6. Self-entered. An individual student may submit entries in a single mailing.

There are no entry fees.


